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SHARING OUR A.A. EXPERIENCES IN THE NEW YEAR

This letter from the Starlight Group in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, is most appropriate for a New Year's issue:

"Last night we had one of our most interesting and informative meetings at our Starlight Rooms... We would like to share this idea that we stumbled upon accidentally, because a couple of members became brave enough to admit they knew nothing about the Third Legacy. As a matter of fact, knew very little about how the First and Second Legacy came about and the real meaning of them.

"We have a past Conference Delegate (CEC C.) in our group. And at the risk of sounding pushie, he volunteered to prepare a talk on the three Legacies. We accepted. Next week's meeting was set aside for this talk.

"We had a good turnout and Cec took us right back to the beginning of A.A. He then proceeded to bring us along right up to the present setup of General Service. He used several articles from the 'Grapevine' and had other members read them. One was how the Twelve Steps were written, an article by Bill. Another was an interesting article by a member from Southern California where he compared the Traditions to a Convoy. He also talked about the 'Grapevine' and the problems G. S. O. had in getting it started.

"The meeting accomplished several things: First, a fuller and almost complete understanding of the Legacies; Second, a closer feeling between us and G.S.O.; Third, a keener interest in the 'Grapevine'; Fourth, it made our group sit up and take notice.

"Many new members asked questions, *proving* there is an interest in G.S.O. and our world Fellowship. We were all excited about something that had been at our fingertips all along but didn't realize how to use it. We *certainly didn't appreciate it*. Above all, it proved to us that right in our midst we had a past New York Delegate that we *hadn't been using*.

"The reason for writing this letter is this. Your office can pass this idea to other areas. Older members can prepare a half-hour talk on the three Legacies. Feel free to ask Cec to outline the exact route he took if you wish. Here is an opportunity for the older member to get into the act — feel wanted and useful.

"I am chairman right now of a Beginner meeting series — and I've already asked Cec to speak to us on our fourteenth and final wrap-up meeting on the three Legacies. 'Grapevine' sales ZOOMED. We order 18 for our group of 41 registered members. This is the first time the entire 18 disappeared on their arrival. Starlight sends in our contribution from our group fund... many members insisted on paying the three dollars back to the group fund.

"I had the privilege of finishing this wonderful meeting by reading our present Conference Delegate's report. Mac C. quoted Bernard Smith on why we need General Service. I've been sober one day at a time for over three years and for the first time, I have the whole story. I'm better informed and I know that I express the feelings of the entire starlight Group."
